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FIRST OF ITS KIND RESEARCH HELPS DEFINE CHILDCARE AND EARLY LEARNING LANDSCAPE IN BEXAR COUNTY

Results identify challenges and opportunities for improving access for children

(SAN ANTONIO) – Results from a comprehensive study commissioned by the City of San Antonio and conducted by the College of Education at Texas A&M University-San Antonio provides new insights into the availability, quality and affordability of childcare in Bexar County.

A first of its kind study for Bexar County includes data from 54 zip codes and all 10 City of San Antonio Council districts.

"This was a significant study for Bexar County to examine the state of early childhood education and early childhood systems," said Melissa M. Jozwiak, Professor of Early Childhood at Texas A&M University-San Antonio. "These findings not only identify ways to improve childcare and economic development, but it begins to create a roadmap for those committed to the long-term success of our community."

Key findings identify challenges and opportunities in five categories for improving access to childcare for families with children under the age of 5 and for cultivating economic mobility of residents of San Antonio.

Childcare Access

Findings show there are not sufficient seats to serve the number of children needing access to childcare. As reported by state licensing and regulatory agencies, the current supply of childcare seats ("Licensed Capacity") is sufficient for only 66% of children under the age of 5 in Bexar County. The actual supply of seats offered by providers ("Operational Capacity") is 30% lower than Licensed Capacity, resulting in 20,000 fewer seats in Bexar County than expected.

Additional barriers include staffing shortages to increase operational capacity, and 93% of childcare providers operating only during traditional work hours of 6 a.m. to 7 p.m., Monday through Friday. Data also indicate a limited supply of childcare seats in South Bexar County.

Quality of Care

In Bexar County, only 32.5% of childcare providers meet high-quality standards from a

state or national accreditation. Furthermore, there is a critical shortage of high-quality seats for infants and toddlers with less than 2% of available seats designated for infants and toddlers in high-quality providers. With more qualified staff, there is an opportunity to increase quality of care.

<u>Affordability</u>

As a whole, high-quality childcare is often not accessible for low- to middle-income families. The data found most childcare providers rely on family-paid tuition models and only 16% offer income-adjusted rates. While 71% of providers across the county accept Texas Workforce Commission subsidies, the availability of subsidies is limited with extensive waitlists.

Workforce Challenges

The data confirmed that staffing shortages are critical, indicating that low wages and demanding work threaten staff retention. It also found that infant and toddler caregivers are the least educated and lowest paid compared to preschool educators.

Special Populations

The research found that providers lack knowledge of military subsidies and face administrative barriers to better serve the city's military families. It also indicated that the distance from military installations to providers that accept military subsidies was a challenge for military families.

For families with children who have exceptional or special needs, there are limited provider options with specialized training, as well as uneven resources for children with special needs across Bexar County.

"This long-anticipated study provides critical insights into the challenges of gathering comprehensive quantitative and qualitative data from providers, stakeholders, and agencies across Bexar County," said Sarah Baray, CEO of PreK 4 SA. "Its findings reaffirm the persistent issues we've encountered in childcare—ranging from affordability and staff shortages to limited infant care—while also underscoring the significance of the city's workforce development and early learning initiatives in fostering economic development."

The data from the study was gathered from a survey of licensed childcare providers, focus groups with childcare owners/administrators, childcare teachers, parents / guardians, and childcare advocates, in addition to figures reported by childcare regulatory agencies.

The study was sponsored by Ready to Work, Economic Development, Human Services, and Pre-K 4 SA. This data will help the City of San Antonio's Economic Development Department ensure San Antonio residents have accessible pathways to well-paying jobs and employers have access to a robust pipeline of talent well into the future.
